

Jerry Kermode Demonstration in Palmerston North


Seven of our members attended this very instructive all day demonstration held at the Manawatu Guild's rooms on the 13 April. There were members from Guilds as far away as Taupo and Hawkes Bay.

Jerry's demonstration included turning a carving mallet, a ball, a plate, off centre turning and a natural edged bowl with stitching.

Turning balls. His secret to turning a spherical ball was to turn the two hemispheres slightly elongated along the lathe bed axis. This means that when cut off the ball and turn it 90 degrees the ball will be slightly out of round on two opposite sides but of the correct diameter at 90degrees to that.

His process is: (Also see diagram below)

- Between centres turn the blank to a cylinder.
- From the tailstock end mark a line about 15 to 20 mm bigger than the radius of your ball. This is the equator line.
- From the equator line mark lines on each side the dimensions of the radius of the ball.
- From this 2 lines mark another line 3mm outside the 2 radius lines. Cutting to these 2 lines will give you a ball slightly elongated.
- Part in along both the "3mm" lines and cut clearance on each end.
- Shape the 2 hemispheres
- On the spare wood closest to the chuck cut a tenon for your chuck jaws.
- Cut off the ball and the tenon
- Insert the tenon into the jaws and cut a jamb chuck to hold the ball.
- Insert the ball into the jamb chuck with the elongated diameter pointing perpendicular to the lathe bed.
- Turn off the titties with the parting tool and with a parting tool gently take the high area down till you get a groove that is almost all the way around but not quite. Ie the groove should nearly touch the equator line but not quite.
- Take the ball out of the jamb chuck and turn it 90 degrees and turn and shape it down to the groove.
- Turn the ball around 180 degrees and shape down to the groove on the other half.



When you have done this the ball will be round.

Turning a Plate.

Drill a hole for the screw chuck to the depth of the plate.

Shape the bottom including the foot. Cut a tenon so the jaws can be used in expansion mode.

Natural Edge Bowl with stitching

The important thing to ensure with a natural edge bowl is to have the two high points with a similar height, the same with the low points. Move the wood block on the tail stock to achieve this. By having even heights the finished piece will look oval when looking straight in.

A biscuit cutter was used to create the slots for the contrasting wood biscuits. The biscuits were tightly hammered home and glued with super glue.

Tips

Make a chatter tool from an old saw blade held in vice grips.

As an aid make a template for max/min jaw sizes also have ones for compression and expansion modes.

To reduce the chances of a skid when doing the final cut practice, put a pencil line on the piece and practice cutting to that line so when you make that final cut you don't get a skid.

For a finish use 50% mineral oil and 50% beeswax, heat it up to melt.
